A Wedding!


In 1871, the Rev. Anderson **Greene Hughes** officiated at the wedding of Samuel Kerr Scott and Leonora Graves.

Sam's parents, Margaret and Henderson Scott were married 22 years earlier by the same minister.






Samuel Kerr Scott Leonora Graves Scott their son Walter as a baby and adult

Arthur Neal Scott's father, Samuel Kerr Scott, married Leonora Graves in 1871. They had one child, Walter Henderson Scott, who was born in 1872. Nora died in 1873. Sam and Nora looked after Sam's younger brothers when they were at the Bingham School in Mebane.



Sam sold all sorts of items in his store and even traded in food, clothing, scrap metal, and tobacco.



Sam died in 1897. A few days later, his first child, Walter, died in Texas.



W.W. Corbett and A.N. Scott, Sr.

In 1904, Arthur Neal Scott went into business with his friend William Warren Corbett. These photos were taken long after the company was founded.

We are told that the Mebane Bedding Company, now known as Kingsdown, started making mattresses and box springs in the loft of Cook's Mill, north of Mebane.

The ticking was sewn from flour sacks sourced from the mill.




Cook's Mill, North of Mebane, NC Photo taken around 1904, the same year the Cook brothers bought the building from L. Banks Holt. Flour sack fabrics were made of very durable fabric. They were often repurposed after the flour they contained was used up.



By 1906, The Mebane Bedding Company had become a significance presence in downtown Mebane. Buildings were added as the company grew. It grew rapidly and became a major employer.



Arthur Neal Scott married in 1906. His first wife, Carrie Pickett, died only two years after the wedding which took place at the bride's home in Efland.



Their daughter, Rubie Pickett Scott was born on April 27, 1907. She was just a baby when her mother passed away.




Arthur Neal and Carrie had one child, Rubie Pickett Scott.




Mebane Bedding bought several other companies in the 1920s. In 1928, they changed their name to the Mebane-Royall Company.


brother: Samuel Kerr Scott, Jr. (1886-1946) salesman located in Mebane

grandson: William Scott Pearson, (1944-) member of board of directors until the company was sold Arthur Neal Scott, Sr., grandchildren William Scott Pearson and Mary Neal Scott Ackiss recall visiting him on his small farm in Mebane.

Business leaders were expected to be active in local civic organizations. Arthur Neal Scott, Sr. was a 32nd degree Mason, a deacon in his church, a member of the Shriners and also the Civitan Club. He was also on the first Board of Directors of the Mebane Home Builders Association.





The population of Mebane increased due to employment opportunities at the White Furniture Company and the Mebane Bedding Company. Local families wished to own rather than rent.



A group of local businessmen met in 1909, to find a way to provide mortgages. Some of the Founders of the Mebane Home Builders Association included:

W. Y. Malone W. W. Corbett and J. Sam White





The First Board of Directors Included:

James Shaw Vincent Dave White and A. N. Scott





Mebane Home Builders generated the money for mortgages by issuing what were effectively certificates of deposit.

Former Location of the Reliable Furniture Company




Mebane First Savings and Loan Today
